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Hurricanes, Heat, and Other Highway Hazards

While Friday, June 20, was technically the first day of summer, every East Texan knows the heat and humidity doesn't follow the calendar. With the arrival of summer conditions comes some of the most challenging and hazardous conditions for TxDOT workers. The National Weather Service's summer seasonal forecast calls for higher than average temperatures around the Lufkin District, and even the state, with less than average rainfall.

And heat isn't the only concern that shows up this time of year. Already, heavy rainfall and strong storms have put road crews hard at work keeping corridors open and operating, and hurricane season is predicted to be busier than usual. The 2025



hurricane season forecast calls for 13 to 19 named storms, and six to 10 hurricanes – between three and five of which are expected to be major – throughout June to November.

So what does all this mean for the dog days of summer along the pavement in the piney woods? It means staying safe now includes watching for heat exhaustion and heat stroke. As well as restocking emergency supplies and reviewing emergency plans. Since TxDOT crews are essential first responders in emergencies, it also means making these preparations at home and with loved ones. Of course, it bears remembering that if you don't like the weather in Texas, just wait a few minutes and it'll change.

Navy Vet Completes Teacher Externship

For 14 years, Rayford Sweats stood at the tip of the spear as a member of the U.S. Navy. He participated in helicopter flight schools, served aboard aircraft carriers, and warships patrolling the Atlantic ocean. "I don't know how y'all do it," Sweats told TxDOT Lufkin leadership while attending New Employee Orientation on Monday, June 2. Sweat said he didn't know if he'd want to face the dangers and challenges of being on a highway crew, but for two weeks, the Corrigan-Camden ISD coach got an in-depth look at how TxDOT workers plan, build, and maintain roadways throughout the Lufkin district.

Sweat, who holds advanced degrees from Waldorf University, was the most recent Texas Workforce Solutions Teacher Externship Program participant. The idea behind the program is to connect classrooms to workplaces and hopefully give them an idea of careers in students' backyards. "Prior to starting the Externship I thought I knew what TxDOT was all about however, I quickly learned that I was immature when it came to their responsibilities," he said. "I will take everything I learned and deliver it to the students and also have TxDOT employees come speak with the students about the organization."

He left the office on Friday, June 13, with his ANSI Class 3 shirt and work boots and a better understanding of what TxDOT is about, he said. I-69 DEVELOPMENT IN THE LUFKIN DISTRICT

There are currently ten projects the Lufkin District is actively developing to meet interstate standards. Below is a brief status on each. For more information on I-69 projects development in the district, please visit our webpage at www.txdot.gov and search "I-69 Projects Overview".

- <u>US 59/SL 224 South Interchange (Under Construction)</u> involves constructing new US 59 direct connectors at SL 224(S) and frontage roads along SL 224 between SH 7 and US 59. Construction began in fall 2019 and is scheduled for completion in winter 2026, weather permitting.
- <u>US 59 Diboll Relief Route (Under Construction)</u> involves constructing a new location controlled-access roadway east of Diboll. Construction began in spring 2020 and is scheduled for completion in fall 2025, weather permitting.
- <u>US 59 Upgrade Moffett Rd to SH 103 (Under Construction</u>) involves upgrading existing US 59 to a controlled-access roadway by adding frontage roads. Construction began in 2021 and was completed spring 2025.
- <u>US 59 Upgrade Redland (Under Construction)</u> involves upgrading existing US 59 to a controlled-access roadway by adding frontage roads between SL 287 and FM 2021. Construction began late in 2022 and is scheduled for completion in fall 2026, weather permitting.
- <u>US 59 Corrigan Relief Route (Under Construction)</u> involves a new location controlledaccess roadway, west of Corrigan. Construction began in fall 2022 and is scheduled for completion in winter 2028, weather permitting.
- <u>US 59 Upgrade Shepherd to Cleveland (Under Construction)</u> involves upgrading existing US 59 to a controlled-access roadway by adding frontage roads between FM 2914 and SL 573. Construction began in 2023 and is scheduled for completion in fall 2029.
- <u>US 59/US 259 North Nacogdoches Interchange (Schematic)</u> involves upgrading US 59 to a controlled-access roadway from Stallings Drive/SL 224 to 1.3 miles north of reconstructing the US 59/US 259 interchange and adding new frontage roads. ROW acquisitions are underway. Construction is currently scheduled to begin in 2029.
- <u>US 59 Upgrade to Shepherd to Trinity River (Schematic)</u> involves upgrading existing US 59 to a controlled-access roadway by adding frontage roads between FM 223 to just north of the Trinity River. ROW acquisitions are underway. Construction is currently scheduled to begin in 2029.
- <u>US 59 Upgrade North Livingston (Schematic)</u> involves reconstructing the US 59/US 190 interchange and reconstructing US 59 main lanes and frontage roads from just south of US 190 to SL 116. TxDOT is currently working on the development of the schematic. Construction is currently scheduled to begin in 2032.
- <u>US 59 Upgrade South Livingston (Feasibility)</u> involves upgrading US 59 to a controlled-access roadway by reconstructing the US 59/FM 1988 interchange, reconstructing US 59 main lanes and adding frontage roads from just south of US 190 to 0.39 miles south of FM 1988. This project currently does not have construction funding identified.
