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Gus Thomasson Bridge at I-30

Full Reconstruction Underway

Pegasus Link Constructors has reached the phase in construction to officially begin the full reconstruction of the Gus Thomasson Road intersection at Interstate I-30. Gus Thomasson Road is one of the many intersecting cross streets that are being reconstructed along the 11-mile 635 East Project. Located southwest of the project in Mesquite, the project team closed the intersection at the end of June, followed by removal of the old bridge to make way for the new intersection and kick off construction.

The Gus Thomasson closure will last up to nine months with one major objective: to convert the overpassing Gus Thomasson bridge into an at-grade underpass, eventually leveling with both directions of Gus Thomasson on its north and south ends of I-30.

Here's What You Need to Know:

- All lanes along northbound and southbound Gus Thomasson Road at I-30 will be closed until spring 2024.
- Alternate detours are in place for drivers to utilize the eastbound and westbound I-30 frontage roads, as well as Motley Drive or Galloway Avenue to get through the long-term closure.
- Do you live or work around the area? Construction along I-30 and I-635 will be ongoing at the same time as bridge construction. Skillman Bridge 2023 Progress


In Dallas' Lake Highlands neighborhood, striking new white arches can be seen on the horizon providing an eyecatching addition to the backdrop of an evolving corridor. Steel for the new Skillman aesthetic bridge have been in place for a few months now, awaiting its new status as the grand entrance to Lake Highlands at the I-635 intersection.

The project team has been making headway with steel work at Skillman since the top of the year, installing prefabricated steel segments through the summer. In June, the final pieces of the arches were installed.

Up next, Skillman bridge deck construction will begin and continue work through 2024, to build the part of the bridge that will incorporate lanes to be utilized by drivers crossing the Skillman intersection when construction is complete.

Once Skillman is fully built in late 2024, the new bridge will stand out as an attractive and functional landmark featuring a steel double-arch, steel crossbeam supports and cable stays from the arch to the bridge deck. Dynamic, color-changing lights will serve their own dual purpose of boosting aesthetics and safety and keeping the pedestrian pathways well lit.

In the Community

The first half of 2023 has been busy as the 635 East team continues its outreach in the community. Loftin's experience in construction photography started when DART invited him to take progress photos of the first light rail system in Dallas almost four decades ago.

Since then, he acquired a large list of contracts with major organizations taking event photographs, capturing video and documenting progress within the transportation, construction and public works fields.

Loftin graduated college in 1986 from East Texas State University (now Texas A&M Commerce), with two degrees: Radio Television Production and Commercial/Advertising Photography.

Before finding his niche in construction, he worked various jobs in advertising doing commercial photography, fashion and video production to develop educational material for children at Color Dynamics Studio, which was the set of popular children's television show, Barney & Friends.

Being from Wolfe City, Texas, Loftin connects his love for the outdoors and country lifestyle to his interest in construction photography. His seasoned experience doing photography in other industries harnesses versatility in his work, which he says adds to his competitive edge.

"The certification I have as a DBE puts another feather in the cap to use," he says in regard to what sets him apart. "It's like going to the grocery store. The fact that I am a minority-owned business, and experienced with different kinds of video and photography, [they] get everything they need in one package."

Loftin stays busy with several high-profile contracts to some of the metroplex's largest infrastructure projects and companies, including the 635 East Project.

The aerial photos that project followers know and love so well were all taken on a helicopter that Loftin rides each month to capture the best angles of the project.

New Connections: Frontage Road Openings of Early 2023

Continuous frontage roads will be, without a doubt, one of the many perks that the 635 East project will deliver to drivers who live and work along the corridor. Implementing bypass lanes at some cross streets and Texas U-turns at all intersections, the roadway additions are sure to greatly improve traffic flow and alleviate congestion as each gradually open to the public within 635 East's remaining years. Many of these new roadway sections will open before the project's anticipated completion of 2025.

The following are what were opened to the public in the first few months of the year.

Westbound I-635 frontage road between Skillman Street and Forest Lane

This traffic switch lengthened the westbound I-635 entrance ramp from Skillman, and provided a lane option separate from the mainlanes connecting Skillman traffic with those trying to access Forest Lane.

Westbound I-635 frontage road between Walnut Hill Lane/Kingsley Road and Plano Road

The opening of this stretch of pavement allowed crews to also open the new exit to Plano, as well as the new entrance from Walnut/Kingsley.

Eastbound I-635 frontage road between Northwest Highway and La Prada Drive

A large stretch of frontage road opened to the public, that allowed a continuous connection between Northwest Highway and La Prada Drive. This new connection provides drivers an option

to travel locally between Northwest Highway, Centerville Road, Ferguson Road, and La Prada Drive without having to access the mainlanes. The exits and entrance ramps between these cross streets were also shifted, providing safer distances to merge with traffic trying to exit and enter I-635.

Westbound I-635 frontage road between La Prada Drive and Centerville Road/Ferguson Road

The most recently opened out of the others on the list, this new roadway section shifted the entrance ramp from La Prada Drive further west.
